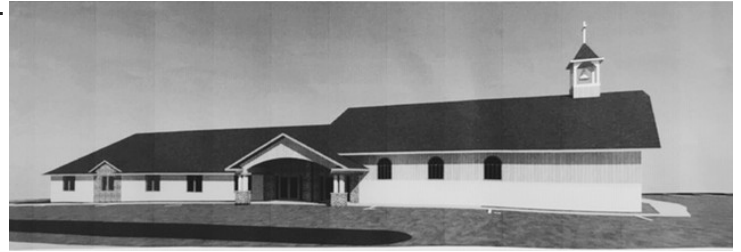

Religious Ed

Gospel Weekly Eucharist Quote: During the celebration of Mass, the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ. But when Mass is over, the host (there is generally nothing left in the chalice because the priest has consumed it) continues to be the Body of Christ. That is why we have the tabernacle, where we place the Body of Christ. The change in substance of the bread and wine, which we call transubstantiation, is complete and permanent. The host does not cease to be the Body of Christ. That body continues to exist as long as the accidents of bread (its color, shape, taste, position, etc.) remain. That is why Saint Angela says that Jesus' presence is there until the end of time—because there is always a tabernacle with the Blessed Sacrament in it. We also speak of the Eucharist as a memorial of Jesus' sacrifice. We remember what Jesus did for us, but not just as a regular memory. The Greeks had a word for it. They called it *anamnesis*. This means that we not only recall what is past, but also that it becomes present in the here and now. The sacrifice of Jesus is timeless. So as we remember what he did, that sacrifice also becomes present as his Body and Blood under the forms of bread and wine.

St. Anthony Lake Nebagamon Pews for Sale

As we get closer to moving into our new church we need to empty the old items from the church.

The committee has received permission from Fr. Andrew to sell the old pews. Before offering the entire lot to outside vendors we have decided to make them available to our parishioners first.

The gentleman we are dealing with for our new pews assessed the value of our pews between \$300 and \$500 each. The value was given because of their age (around 100 years old) and the architecture of the pew ends, which he indicated would be worth that much alone. The buyer will be responsible for removal of the pews.

The board will give parishioners two weeks to decide if they would like to buy a pew or pews in remembrance of our church's history. After the two weeks have passed, we will offer the balance to the companies that have shown an interest in acquiring them.

We also have some beautiful windows that need to be saved. These windows were donated by individual families and the board would like them to go to these families. If you are a member of the family with their name on the plaque, you may have the window for free—you just need to remove it. WEEKLY MEDITATION

Let's take a look at some of the main themes of the readings for the 2nd Sunday of Easter.

1st Reading – Acts 4:32-35

The Early Church shares all things in common; no one suffers from grave need. The apostles offer their witness to the resurrection of Christ; they are filled with great power.

Psalm – 118:2-4, 13-15, 22-24

The "stone rejected by the builders has become the cornerstone" now applies to Jesus. Christ was rejected, and submitted to the agony of the Cross; Christ's resurrection now becomes the cornerstone of our faith in God. Our strength and courage from the Lord, who is our savior.

2nd Reading – 1 John 5:1-6

Everyone who believes in Christ is empowered to love God and one another. Our love for the Lord empowers us to keep his commandments. Our faith in Christ leads to a victory that conquers the world.

Gospel – John 20:19-31

Jesus appears to the disciples, offering them peace and the Holy Spirit. Jesus appears to the disciples (this time with Thomas) and speaks about those who have not seen the Risen Lord but who in faith overcome their doubt and believe.
