

Bring faith to life. Find life in faith.

Choose abundance.

This month, we celebrate Thanksgiving. Many will gather at table with family and friends, eat favorite foods, and pause to share the

things for which they are thankful. While it is wonderful to have this annual time for giving and sharing gratitude, every day can and should be a day for thanks-giving, for calling to mind the many blessings of life, faith, relationships, talents and gifts, material and financial resources.

This isn't a simple glass-half-empty or glass-half-full sort of thing. Many of us have been taught to think about life through a lens of scarcity: What is missing?

What needs fixing? An attitude of gratitude leads us to look at life instead through a perspective of abundance. We see that each day

and all that surrounds us is a gift from God, and grow in our desire to share with others out of gratitude for our many blessings.

Make choosing abundance over scarcity a habit. It is easy to get caught up in our daily routines and activities and lose sight of God's grace and abundance in our midst. People who study the formation of habits tell us that it helps to prompt ourselves to remember what we are trying to make part of life. Following the prompt, practice the behavior, and then pay attention to the difference the habit makes in order for it to stick.

At first, this may seem awkward or forced. Stick with it! You'll soon recognize God's abundant

grace beyond what you are able to comprehend. Such a grateful life does take practice. It is sure to have lasting impact, so that your life will be full and overflowing with abundance!



A thanksgiving prayer

Good and gracious God, you are the source of every good gift, of all we are and have and will be. We give you thanks this day for the abundant blessings of life, faith, family, and friends, for the beauty of creation and all that reminds us of your goodness. Open our hearts to perceive your grace in our midst, our minds to learn and know your truth, and our hands to share your loving presence in the world. Guide us as we commit ourselves to living as good and faithful stewards of the many gifts you have given us. We ask this in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord, through the working of the Holy Spirit. Stay awake!

It happens to the best of us. We grow complacent, weary, blind to the love of God and the needs of others.

"Therefore, stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come."
(MT 24:42)

Jesus' message is clear. We do not know when Christ will return in ultimate, final glory, establishing forever the kingdom of God on earth. This is not intended to frighten us, but to wake us up, reminding us to be watchful and ready.

Wake up to God's Purposes

We must admit that we are often not fully awake. Our lives take on a particular rhythm of interactions and activities, for better or worse, and unless we are intentional about it, faith is not a factor in our daily lives. Staying awake is about living "on purpose," keeping God's purposes in mind. Jesus helps us understand that God's way is about putting

God and others first. God's way is to be awake to the people who need care, mercy, forgiveness, and compassion. God's way is to be watchful for systems and situations that are not just, in which peace is desperately needed, at home, in local communities, in our nation and in the world.

Live On Purpose

To be awake is to be constantly attentive to the ways in which we may respond to the people and situations that need God's love. Living each day on purpose, intentionally shaping our daily interactions and decisions out of love of God and neighbor insures that we will be ready "on the day the Lord will come."

Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you?

1 Corinthians 3:16



This year, the Sunday before
Thanksgiving is the final Sunday of the
liturgical year, the Solemnity of Our
Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.
We are baptized into Christ's life as
priest, prophet, and king. Today, we are
reminded that following Jesus' kingship
is not about earthly power, but rather of

humble obedience to God's will. "The Lord wishes to spread His kingdom also by means of the laity, namely, a kingdom of truth and life, a kingdom of holiness and grace, a kingdom of justice, love and peace....Clearly then a great promise and a great trust is committed to the disciples: 'All things are yours, and you are Christ's, and Christ is God's.' (1 Cor 3:23) (LG, 36)

This mission of spreading Christ's kingdom is sacred, although not always easy. Faith in Jesus Christ calls us to persevere, to "stick with it" even when it is difficult to do so. Our faith is sure to be tested, by the circumstances of daily life, by aspects of our social and cultural surroundings, by the knowledge that many in our world suffer the effects of violence, poverty, war, and injustice.

Throughout his earthly ministry, in his death on the cross, and in his resurrection, Jesus helps us to grasp the implications of discipleship, and he encourages us to keep the wider view, certain that the challenges of the moment will not have the final word. Jesus, the Word made flesh, the king of the universe, is that final word, that of truth, life, holiness, grace, justice, love, and peace.





Cenacle Prayer Group

Would you like to be part of a faith sharing small group? Are you looking for a weekly opportunity to pray and reflect on how God is working in your life, but in a way that respects your time and is both focused and positive? Our cluster is looking for people who want to grow together in faith through a Cenacle prayer group.

Cenacle - a faith sharing small group (it refers to the "Upper Room" where the disciples met.)

Cenacle Key Points

The group is ideally composed of 4-7 people.

Each week, a different person in the group leads the Cenacle.

The group meets weekly (with rare exceptions based on holidays and life situations).

The Cenacle lasts between 30-60 minutes; it never goes beyond an hour.

The group can meet in person or digitally

- If in person, do it at a regular time that suits everyone (after Mass, over coffee, at home, etc.)
- If online, use what works for your group (FaceTime, Google Meet, a Zoom call, etc.)

Cenacle Format - THIS IS WHAT YOU ACTUALLY DO

- Opening Prayer (1-2 minutes)
 - o Led by whoever is leading the meeting that week; when in doubt, use the Our Father!
- Check in with each other (10-15 minutes)
 - o Each person takes 2-4 minutes (never more than 5!) to share events from the past week
- Reflection (15-30 minutes)
 - o Sunday Gospel Reading
 - The Gospel is read out loud
 - People share something (a word/phrase/image) that touched them from the reading
- Goals for the coming week (10-15 minutes)
 - o Each person takes 2-3 minutes to share their goals and objectives for the coming week.
- Closing Prayer
 - o Each person names any specific prayer intentions that they have.
 - o The Leader offers a concluding prayer; if you're not sure what prayer to use, say the Hail Mary!

Hallmarks of a healthy Cenacle

- Positivity the focus is always on personal growth when sharing struggles; "venting" is to be avoided.
- Vulnerability requires participants to be real in their joys and burdens.
- Leadership group is accountable: gossip, toxic behaviors, being present, not monopolizing time, etc.
- Investment participants make the Cenacle a priority and are thoughtfully present and prepared.

Who can join?

- Anyone! What's required is someone who wants to make a weekly commitment to grow in faith.
- In fact, if you connect each week on a Zoom call, you can be anywhere in the world!
 - O Note: the big thing is that people make this a priority in their lives.
 - Once a week, they come together to pray, reflect, and support each other.
 - o It's not complicated, but over time we find ourselves growing closer to God and each other.





Participation in OCIA is beneficial for people in many situations:

- Those with no faith-based experience.
- Those from other denominations who feel that they are being called to the Catholic Church.
- Baptized Catholics who would like to complete their Sacraments of Initiation.
- Non-Catholics who are married to a Catholic and would like to learn more about their spouses' faith.
- Fully initiated Catholics who feel that their understanding of the basics of the Catholic Church is dated and/or incomplete.



The collective wisdom of the bishops* who created this text put these words in this order on purpose. They knew that to love and serve God, we first need to know Him.




