WEEKLY MEDITATION

Here are some of the main themes in the readings for the 3rd Sunday of Easter.

1st Reading - Acts: 2:14,22-33

- Peter preaches to the people about the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.
- Peter cites Psalm 16, revealing how this passage is fulfilled in Christ.

Psalm - 16:1-2,4,7-11

- "Lord, you will show us the path of life."
- The passage recaps a substantial amount of what Peter quoted to the people in the first reading.

2nd Reading - 1st Peter 1:17-21

- This exhortation to conduct ourselves with reverence finds its strength in Christ, the spotless unblemished blood of the lamb of God.
- Christ is revealed to us through our faith, hope, and belief in God.

Gospel - Luke 24:13-35

- On the road to Emmaus, two disciples encounter Jesus along the way as he interprets the scripture passages that refer to Christ.
- During the breaking of the bread, they recognize Jesus - who disappears from their sight - and return to Jerusalem to announce to the disciples what they experienced.
- This basic structure - Scripture and the breaking of the bread - is the basic outline for the Mass we celebrate!

Impact



From the worst to the best

The worst day ever. Just thinking about it takes us back to that moment, when a loved one died, a relationship was broken, a career we were passionate about was ended. Each of us has that “worst day” in the recent or distant past, that day from which we have not fully recovered, in which we still know sorrow, anger, disappointment, and darkness.

Mary Magdalene had experienced her worst day at Jesus’ crucifixion. The one whom she had come to love and in whom she put her faith had suffered and was brutally killed before her very eyes. Still reeling and weighed down by Jesus’ death, she went to the tomb with the other Mary to carry out the heavy responsibility of anointing Jesus’ body for burial.

The disciples who were walking to Emmaus had experienced their worst day, too. With Jesus’ death, their hope had died as well. “But we were hoping that he would be the one to redeem Israel.” Perhaps that is why the worst days remain in our memory so profoundly. In the moment of extreme pain, grief, and disappointment, our hope is shaken. We simply do not know how to carry on.



Jesus met Mary Magdalene and the other Mary on the way. He reassured them in the midst of their fear and told them to share the good news with the disciples. He met the two who were walking to Emmaus on their way as well, even as they were walking away from Jerusalem and the company of the other disciples. He consoled them in their dejection, and helped them understand the fullness of God’s love, which is poured out in and through Christ.

Everything changed for Mary and the disciples through an encounter with the risen Lord. They were “fearful yet overjoyed.” Their hearts burned. They did not forget their worst day, but it was redeemed through the resurrection of Jesus. They found light and hope in place of darkness.

Jesus meets us on our way, too, and wants us to encounter him in sacrament and word and the loving care of family and community. Our Lord wants us to hear his voice saying, “do not be afraid,” and be assured that we have great hope through his resurrection, the hope that our worst days - days of grief, fear, and disappointment - do not have the final word, the hope that in Christ, the best is yet to come.

This is the day the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad.

Faith NOW

Imagine for a moment that you have been taken back in time and have been invited to share a meal with the earliest of Christian communities. The people gather, listen to the apostles as they recount their experiences of journeying with Jesus, hear the sorrow in their voices as they tell of that horrible day when Jesus was crucified and their astonishment at the news of Jesus' resurrection. As they break bread, they remember Jesus' words at his last supper with them, when he commanded them to "do this in remembrance of me." They share how even now, they do not fully understand all Jesus said and did, and yet, they realize they are responsible for drawing others into the way that the Lord taught them, God's way of life and love.

While we cannot go back in time, we can take the witness of the apostles to heart, hear the good news of Jesus Christ as though we are hearing it for the first time, open our hearts to his love and message, and grasp more fully our responsibility to share the story with others. We, too, can devote ourselves to the apostles' teaching, to the breaking of the bread and the prayers. We, too, may be filled with awe at the wonders and signs of God's love that surround us. We may remind ourselves to be filled with gratitude, to praise God and so move others to answer the call to live as disciples and grow as good stewards, just as the first communities of believers did.

Inspired by the early community of believers

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved. (Acts 2:42-47 NRSV)

Easter every day

Easter is a day and a season and more. The impact of Easter is for every day, in every season of life and faith. In the moments when it seems the world is filled with goodness and life, we know Easter joy. In times of turmoil and sadness, we dig deep and find Easter consolation and strength. How do we live Easter every day? Learn from the gospels we hear in this Easter season:

Trust. Hear Jesus speak to you as he did the women at the tomb, "do not be afraid," and be assured that no trial or challenge is greater than the everlasting life and love of God.

Pray. Jesus listened as the disciples on the road described their sadness and disappointment. Be honest with the Lord. Trust that you can pour your heart out to him.

Believe. While we sometimes doubt or struggle to follow him, Jesus promises we will find blessing in faith. Take a step toward him today.

Share. Like Mary Magdalene, the disciples, and the early Christian communities, witness to the good news of Jesus Christ through word and action, in caring and selfless sharing.

The recipient of the **Lumen Christi Award** this year is **Patricia ‘Pat’ Wildenberg**.

The award is presented to a member of our community who lives the values that our School strives to instill in our students. The award is called “Lumen Christi” which means “the Light of Christ,” and it refers to Christ as the source of truth, faith, knowledge, and character. Pat’s involvement at Cathedral School, her passion for youth ministry and her dedication to the Diocese of Superior are inspiring and make it easy to honor her.

Patricia Wildenberg was born in Appleton, Wisconsin to Bob and Jane Baumann. She grew up on a farm with six siblings in a family that valued faith, hard work, and Catholic education. Her parents believed deeply in the importance of a Catholic education and instilled that same conviction in their children. Pat was especially grateful for the sacrifices her parents made to send all seven of their children through 12 years of Catholic school. It was during her years at St. John Catholic High School in Little Chute that she met her husband, Bill Wildenberg.

Pat and Bill were married in 1973. In 1987, they moved to Superior when the paper mill opened in Duluth. Together they raised their four children in Superior, proudly sending each of them to Cathedral School. Pat quickly became an active volunteer, serving as CHASA president, coordinating the magazine sale, running the hot lunch program one day each week, and leading her daughter’s Girl Scout troop.

When her daughter Julie was in third grade, Pat was volunteering many hours each week when a friend encouraged her to apply for a position with the Diocese of Superior. She began what would become a 25-year career of dedicated service. Pat worked closely with Richard Lyons and Msgr. Philip Heslin, and later served as Administrative Assistant to three bishops: Bishop Fliss, Bishop Christensen, and Bishop Powers.

Pat holds especially fond memories of her involvement with Superior Area Youth Ministry. She helped organize and support Ski Blast, NET retreats, confirmation retreats, NCYC, TEC retreats, and the Diocesan Youth Rally. She also helped coordinate youth trips to World Youth Day in Denver, where participants saw Pope John Paul II, as well as a service trip for flood relief in Grand Forks and a Chicago mission trip through Young Neighbors in Action.

Pat continued her volunteer service at St. Anthony Catholic Church and later at Cathedral of Christ the King. She has generously shared her time as a confirmation teacher, religious education teacher, Development Committee member, lector, Eucharistic minister, tour guide, and by assisting with funeral luncheons.

Through her lifelong dedication to faith, family, and community, Pat has left a lasting impact on Catholic education and youth ministry in the Superior area.

Cenacle Prayer Group

Would you like to be part of a faith sharing small group? Are you looking for a weekly opportunity to pray and reflect on how God is working in your life, but in a way that respects your time and is both focused and positive? Our cluster is looking for people who want to grow together in faith through a Cenacle prayer group.

Cenacle – a faith sharing small group (it refers to the “Upper Room” where the disciples met.)

Cenacle Key Points

The group is ideally composed of 4-7 people.

Each week, a different person in the group leads the Cenacle.

The group meets weekly (with rare exceptions based on holidays and life situations).

The Cenacle lasts between 30-60 minutes; it never goes beyond an hour.

The group can meet in person or digitally

- If in person, do it at a regular time that suits everyone (after Mass, over coffee, at home, etc.)
- If online, use what works for your group (FaceTime, Google Meet, a Zoom call, etc.)

Cenacle Format – THIS IS WHAT YOU ACTUALLY DO

- Opening Prayer (1-2 minutes)
 - Led by whoever is leading the meeting that week; when in doubt, use the Our Father!
- Check in with each other (10-15 minutes)
 - Each person takes 2-4 minutes (never more than 5!) to share events from the past week
- Reflection (15-30 minutes)
 - Sunday Gospel Reading
 - The Gospel is read out loud
 - People share something (a word/phrase/image) that touched them from the reading
- Goals for the coming week (10-15 minutes)
 - Each person takes 2-3 minutes to share their goals and objectives for the coming week.
- Closing Prayer
 - Each person names any specific prayer intentions that they have.
 - The Leader offers a concluding prayer; if you're not sure what prayer to use, say the Hail Mary!

Hallmarks of a healthy Cenacle

- Positivity – the focus is always on personal growth when sharing struggles; “venting” is to be avoided.
- Vulnerability – requires participants to be real in their joys and burdens.
- Leadership – group is accountable: gossip, toxic behaviors, being present, not monopolizing time, etc.
- Investment – participants make the Cenacle a priority and are thoughtfully present and prepared.

Who can join?

- Anyone! What's required is someone who wants to make a weekly commitment to grow in faith.
- In fact, if you connect each week on a Zoom call, you can be anywhere in the world!
 - Note: the big thing is that people make this a priority in their lives.
 - Once a week, they come together to pray, reflect, and support each other.
 - It's not complicated, but over time we find ourselves growing closer to God and each other.

Choose a Group Leader and connect with Fr. Andrew to begin
